STOP AND SHOP

The Council's Stop and Shop proposals have the declared aim of providing more short term parking space for shoppers. This is necessarily at the expense of local residents because the proposals provide for Pay and Display bays Off Broadway, including eight at the top of Hillfield Park and 8 at the top of St James's Lane. This would mean reducing the free spaces available to residents in this area by almost 10%. Comments have been sent on behalf of our Neighbourhood Watch to the effect that the proposals for the additional P&D would make it even harder for our residents to park in their own road during the day (as many need to do), or to find space for electricians, plumbers and other vital technicians; and that the only way of redressing the balance would be a limited CPZ to

O'NEILLS AGAIN

This is because the permission to stay open late at weekends, granted by the Planning Committee 2 years ago, ran out at the end of June; and their application for permission to renew it (and to stay open till midnight during the week) has been rejected. The main

The upshot is that the late hours which were granted by the Licensing Committee last year cannot now be taken up without breaking the planning laws. Mitchells and Butlers will not be happy brewers about the result and will probably appeal; but for the moment we may expect a significant reduction in late night noise from the Broadway.
